Grounds for Opposition

- 1. Opposer owns the domain name LIVEPHOTO.COM
- Opposer plans to use the website to sell interactive software that brings life to still image photos
- 3. The term LIVE PHOTOS is commonly understood to refer to goods for recording and displaying images, video and sound.
- 4. Therefore, the proposed mark is generic or merely descriptive of the goods.
- 5. Opposer will be damaged by the registration of LIVE PHOTOS because it would give Applicant the right to prevent Opposer from using LIVE PHOTO

Descriptive Terms

 A mark is merely descriptive "if it immediately conveys knowledge of a quality, feature, function, or characteristic of the goods or services with which it is used."

 Coach Servs. v. Triumph Learning LLC, 668 F.3d 1356, 1377-1378, 101 USPQ2d 1713, 1728 (Fed. Cir. 2012)



Acquired distinctiveness

- A descriptive mark can be registered if it has come to serve a trademark function of identifying a particular source of goods or services.
- To establish that a term has acquired distinctiveness, "an applicant must show that in the minds of the public, the primary significance of a product feature or term is to identify the source of the product rather than the product itself."
 - Coach Servs., 102 USPQ2d at 1219



Generic Terms

 A generic term "is the common descriptive name of a class of goods or services." Royal Crown Co. v. Coca-Cola Co., 892 F.3d 1358, 1366, 127 USPQ2d 1041, 1045-1046 (Fed. Cir. 2018) (quoting H. Marvin Ginn Corp. v. Int'l Ass'n of Fire Chiefs, Inc., 782 F.2d 987, 989, 228 USPQ 528, 530 (Fed. Cir. 1986)).

Descriptive Terms - Evidence

 Evidence that a term is merely descriptive "may be obtained from any competent source, such as dictionaries, newspapers, or surveys."

Coach Servs., 101 USPQ2d at 1728



Generic Terms - Evidence

- "Evidence of the public's understanding of the term may be obtained from any competent source, such as purchaser testimony, consumer surveys, listings in dictionaries, trade journals, newspapers and other publications."
 - Royal Crown, 127 USPQ2d at 1046 (citing Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner, & Smith, Inc., 828 F.2d 1567, 1570, 4 USPQ2d 1141, 1143 (Fed. Cir. 1987)).



Opposer's Main Trial Evidence - Witness Testimony


- Direct Testimony Declaration of Gang Cao
 - Pursuant to 37 CFR § 2.123(a)(1)
 - Attests to development of technology, including computer software, in the field of adding animation to still images since at least as early as 2015
 - Attests to observations of allegedly generic, thirdparty use of LIVE PHOTOS as well as such use by Applicant.





Applicant's Evidence – Witness Testimony

- Testimony of Gang Cao -- Cross Examination by Written Questions
 - -37 CFR § 2.123(a)(1) provides for crossexamination by written questions because Cao is located outside the U.S.
 - Per 37 CFR § 2.124(d)(2), proceedings were suspended pending completion

- Printouts from Applicant's website showing its use of LIVE PHOTOS; Applicant's 10-K filings

 - Confirms that all of the articles attached as Exhibits 55 and 99 through 154 of Apple's Notice of Reliance come from the LexisNexis database of published articles and news stories.



Applicant's Evidence - Witness Testimony

- Affidavit of ELIZABETH ROSENBERG
 - Records Request Processor at the Internet Archive
 - Explains how the Wayback Machine works
 - Authenticates exhibits that are browser printouts of the Internet Archive's records of files archived by the Wayback Machine.



Applicant's Evidence – Witness Testimony

Testimony **Declaration** of THOMAS R. LA PERLE – Senior Director, Apple Inc.'s Legal Department:

- Applicant's use of its LIVE PHOTOS software feature.
- Evidence, such as dictionary, press excerpts show that the LIVE PHOTOS mark is not generic.
- Evidence showing widespread consumer association, or secondary meaning, of the LIVE PHOTOS mark with Apple.
- Opposer's alleged lack of use of the phrase "Live Photos"

Live Photos An iPhone camera feature starting with the iPhone 6s that records three seconds of video (MOV) along with the still JPEG photo. When the picture is taken, the previous 1.5 seconds of the continuously recorded video are retained along with the subsequent 1.5 seconds. The files are double the size of the normal 2MB JPEG.

Opposer's Rebuttal Evidence

- Oral cross-examination of Thomas R. La Perle
- Notices of Reliance on
 - EUIPO's 2018 decision relating to Applicant's European Union application for LIVE PHOTOS
 - 10 Canadian applications filed by Applicant for LIVE PHOTOS and one for LIVEPHOTOKIT
 - Internet printouts from third-party cell phone and tablet manufacturers, and wireless phone carriers
 - Opposer's three patent applications (filed under seal)

Arguments at Trial – Opposer's Brief

- Applicant's computer software creates live photos
- LIVE PHOTOS is generic for animated photos
- Alternatively, the term is merely descriptive without having acquired distinctiveness
- Prior to Applicant's adoption of the term, others were using, and continue to use, LIVE PHOTOS to refer to the same technology



Arguments at Trial – Applicant's Brief

- Opposer lacks entitlement (standing)
- Evidentiary Objections to Opposer's rebuttal evidence (improper rebuttal; foreign TMA's)
- LIVE PHOTOS is suggestive; a still image is not "live"
- LIVE PHOTOS has acquired distinctiveness as a feature on Applicant's iPhones and iPads based on substantially exclusive use since 2015



Arguments at Trial – Opposer's Reply

- LIVE PHOTOS names the category of photo made by Applicant's software – it is generic
- LIVE PHOTOS describes a key aspect of the software – it is merely descriptive
- Consumers do not perceive LIVE PHOTOS as identifying a product of Applicant's – there is no secondary meaning attached to it
- Evidence admissible; Board can determine weight
